



## Alcohol Policy at Princeton University

The University alcoholic beverage policy is designed to be consistent with the laws of the State of New Jersey and also reflects the need for mutual respect and personal responsibility within a diverse community.

The University and Borough Prohibits:

- Transporting of an open container of alcohol across common spaces of the University. (Common spaces are areas such as lounges, open campus, meeting halls, etc. outside of Reunions Headquarters).
- Possession of a container of alcohol by persons under the age of 21.
- Serving of alcohol to persons under the age of 21.

The State of New Jersey has very strict laws concerning driving under the influence of alcohol and drugs. Persons found guilty of DWI charges are subject to substantial penalties, including fines and imprisonment. In addition, the Borough of Princeton prohibits the transporting of open containers of alcohol in public places, such as streets and sidewalks (including Prospect Street). Finally, please note that golf carts are considered vehicles for purposes of DWI and Open Container laws.

# Wireless Networking

Several areas of the campus also offer wireless networking. These areas include central campus, from Firestone Plaza to Alexander Beach, the café in Frist, the grassy lawn outside the Frist eating area, several rooms in Firestone Library, and parts of the Friend Center. To access the wireless network, simply configure your computer's wireless connection to "Use DHCP," set the "network name" to "puwireless" and restart while in one of the areas listed above. #### Connecting to the Network

All dorm rooms have active network jacks. Each room has one active network jack per pillow. You will need an Ethernet cable to connect your computer to the network. Simply plug in, configure it to "Use DHCP," (see below) and restart your computer; you should then be able to gain access to the Internet. Please note that if your company uses a private Intranet network, you may not have access to it.

# Configuring Your Computer

Once you reach campus simply configure your computer's network settings to "Use DHCP" to obtain an IP address. Both PCs (Windows 9/98/2000/XP) and Macintoshes (OS 7.5 or above) can be configured to use DHCP.
